Beloved in Christ,

During the past few weeks, I've reflected a great deal upon our Lutheran heritage and tradition, more than since I affirmed my baptism back at Kansas Lake Lutheran in rural Butterfield, MN in May of 1970. The 500th Anniversary of Martin Luther's 95 Theses, nailed to the Wittenberg Castle door, will do that sort of thing. Upon such reflection, we can appreciate the complexity of issues which confronted God's people of that time, and how fundamentally the world was changing with the advent of an information age made possible by the printing press and the radical ideas about personal freedom and choice unleashed by the Enlightenment and reformers of the Roman Catholic Church, such as Martin Luther.

Today, we also live in a time which shares many similarities with Martin Luther's time. The internet has created a new information age, in which an almost limitless amount of information is available through any computer connected with the web. However, this unlimited access to information has fostered a growing distrust of information sources and institutions. Accountability for truthfulness and accuracy has disintegrated at the sound of voices which pander to our deepest fears, fears which we may deny or fail to acknowledge.

But for those who hold Christ at the center of life, hope abounds. We see God at work in our daily lives, in the blessings of daily food, housing, family and work. In Martin Luther's Small Catechism, "daily bread" means,

"Everything included in the necessities and nourishment of our bodies, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, farm, livestock, money, property, and upright spouse, upright children, upright members of the household, upright and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, decency, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like."

From Luther's perspective, in this and in his commentaries on the Lord's Prayer, the Apostle's Creed and the Ten Commandments, God is a source of hope, strength and blessing. God's commands are meant for our blessing and flourishing, for good and orderly society, healthy, nurturing relationships and community, and the well-being of all creation. Could this be what Jesus means by "abundant life" in his teaching at John 10:1-10?

"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

Jesus makes the claim that he is the gateway to abundant life. In the Gospel of John, he also asserts that he is the way, the truth and the life. So, dear friends, we have a question to ask, and a decision to make each day. Will I live this day with Jesus as my gateway to abundant life?

I am deeply grateful to God that we are chosen and called by God and equipped by God's Holy Spirit to live in a family of faith at St. James who are empowered to answer YES. Yes to repentance, yes to God's grace, yes to our neighbor, yes to reconciliation, and yes to Jesus' way, truth and life.

Stewardship October 2017 Report

Our Mission & Ministry Deficit continued to get LARGER in September. Although

our spending remains comparable to last year, our giving is falling SHORT. We look to you for HELP!!

For the first nine months of 2017, our Total Mission & Ministry receipts from Offerings and Other Income were \$265,411. Our total spending on Mission & Ministry programs was \$279,442. Our General Operating Funds' actual deficit for the first nine months of 2017 was \$14,031 and resulted in the General Fund having to internally borrow from other St. James' Dedicated Funds as of September 30, 2017.

The Finance & Stewardship Committee encourages you to INCREASE your giving to our general operating fund for Mission & Ministry programs in the last three months of 2017.

Some Tips from St. James' Care of Creation Team

How to prepare your wildlife garden for winter: Autumn is a key season for the wildlife garden. Take a few simple steps now and you can help a host of animals to find plenty to eat and safe hiding places for the coming winter. In addition to providing habitats for a host of overwintering residents, a good wildlife garden will attract flocks of birds. In fact, the harsher the weather and the less food there is in the countryside, the more important gardens become for animals and birds.

Things to do in Autumn: Most people tend to tidy their gardens in autumn, but often take this to the extreme. They blitz them, removing most of the shelter for wildlife and leaving overwintering invertebrates homeless in the process. You can help wildlife by leaving as much tidying up as possible until the end of winter, and doing so can make your garden look more attractive, too.

6 Top Wildlife Gardening Tips

- Spread fallen leaves over your flowerbeds.
- Leave dry plant stems standing in the garden all kinds of insects will crawl inside to spend the winter. When you do cut them in spring, leave them in a stack until May to allow all of the overwintering insects to emerge.
- Avoid cutting hedges until the end of winter to provide valuable shelter for birds and give them more time to eat the berries.
- Resist the urge to cut back ivy growing on walls and fences. Wait until March so the berries are available to birds and the foliage can provide a foraging habitat for insect-eaters such as tits.
- Clear your pond out between October and early January this is when wildlife activity is lowest.
- Put a few clay (not concrete) roof tiles in the pond to provide cover for overwintering frogs and other aquatic wildlife. If there is a cold snap and your pond freezes over, do not leave the ice or the water will become deprived of oxygen. Melt it by placing a pan of hot water on the surface.

Endowment Corner

How to Give Property or Gifts to Your Children

There are many reasons that parents give gifts to their children. A parent must first be self-sufficient in planning for their own remaining time before they can provide gifts to them. These gifts will provide two types of education; first the children learn how to manage and invest these gifts. Secondly, the parents understand how their children will use these gifts and better prepare for future gifts.

There are many different ways that gifts can be made to children

- Cash gifts: You can simply write a check. You can give an annual amount that can be tax free up to a set amount. If this is given annually, a child may become accustomed to living at that level. A gift of property may make more sense.
- **Stock gifts:** This can be set up by setting up a brokerage account for a child and transferring the stock. For tax purposes, the cost basis at the time of sale is the price paid for by the parent.
- Mutual funds: An account can be set up and money put into it. The tax basis is similar to that of a stock gift.
- Gifts of Land or Home: This can be done using a warranty or grant deed. In some states a quitclaim deed is used. To keep the gift under the maximum allowed for tax purposes, a partial transfer can be done over a number of years.
- Uniform Transfers to Minors Act (UTMA): Under this umbrella, you may transfer assets to a custodian of a minor child to manage. When the child reaches legal age, they take ownership of the assets.
- Trust for children: These can be very flexible and state an age when the child can receive the assets.
- **Tax-free Trust for children:** If the parent has appreciated property, it can be transferred to a charitable remainder trust with annual payments made to the child. There are several options and can get quite involved.

The above mentioned are ways in which assets may be distributed before death. It is not meant to offer legal advice. As always, consult a professional in the field to determine what may be the best approach for you.
